The Treasure Trail

One of the highlights of our summer was the Garden Club Treasure Trail on 9th August. We all set off at 10am from the Dingle, travelling via Little Malvern, Eastnor, Dymock and Kempley to end up sharing a picnic in the orchard at Hellens, with donkeys nearby and hens scrabbling for crumbs round our feet. On the way we noted the answers to sometimes cryptic questions, which made us look more closely at things by the wayside and in the beautiful churches we visited. A lovely day, thanks to Chris Hall who devised and organised the whole thing; he has promised us another one next year. It is open to all club members, totally free, and a wonderful day out, so try to come next year!

Hilary Ward once again opened her garden for the club. The afternoon started with a thunderstorm but after sheltering in Hilary's house people were able to wander around and enjoy this lovely garden.

There were refreshments and the chance to chat and socialise on what turned out to be a delightful evening, thank you Hilary.

SNIPPETS FROM HARCOURT BARN

Firstly, an update on the Goat's-beard saga. This year we had no new hybrids (neither from seed that I'd saved from last year's plant nor self-sown) and last year's hybrid turned out not to be perennial. Disappointing but I will keep monitoring in future years.

The seed head of one of the Goat's-beard plants provided a temporary roof over the heads of a couple of Hairy Shield bugs. The following day there was no sign of either.



Some of our Foxgloves displayed the strange phenomenon of enlarged terminal flower buds ('terminal peloria'), a well-known floral genetic mutation that occurs spontaneously – but infrequently – in nature.





Some new (to me) wildlife that caught my attention included this striking Rose Sawfly (Arge pagana). It is fairly common but not one that I have noticed before. Its larvae eat rose leaves and can cause severe defoliation. Our Mermaid rose suffered mildly.





A Grass Snake laid eggs in the compost heap and in August I saw 2 young snakes - these had orange collars which become yellow as they mature.

Once again we had a Long-tailed Tit nest and as in 2021 they chose a Barberry bush as a protective site. Sadly, I think the nest was predated and I never saw any young.

A few different moths and their caterpillars turned up in the house and garden including:

Mullein moth whose distinctive caterpillars feed on Verbascum plants and Rosy Footman which frequent woodland habitats and their caterpillars eat lichens on trees.





A couple of rather fierce looking caterpillars - Pale Tussock moth which can be a pest of hop plants and Grey Dagger moth whose larvae feed on a wide variety of deciduous trees including Hawthorn, Birch, Oak, and Elm.





A couple of wonderful exotic plants which I would love to grow, but sadly not likely to be hardy here, were Impatiens tinctoria at Bodnant Gardens, a relative of the invasive Himalayan Balsam, and, in the greenhouse at Lower Hope Garden near Ullingswick, a climbing vine of a S. American species of Aristolochia, a type of Dutchman's Pipe.





I did, for the first time, try Safflower which did not grow or flower well, but the seeds heads were very attractive.
